V. *Low Incidence Equipment Application Report

J. Silva

Jen Silva, Principal of Low Incidence, presented the Low Incidence Equipment Application Report for March 2025. She noted that the number of applications submitted in March was slightly lower compared to previous months. Jen also shared that the team has recently ordered a new item called Tonies, which allow students to tactilely select a character and independently choose and listen to a story.

VI. *FCSS Operated Programs Class Size Capacity

C. Borges

Chris Borges, Executive Director of Special Education, presented the Class Size Capacity report as of April 3, 2025. Currently, there are 78 classrooms serving 678 students. Chris noted that referral numbers are particularly high at this time of year, with IEP meetings actively taking place. She reviewed the referral data for each program, highlighting that the TIES program has received the highest number of referrals. Many of these students are in foster care or group homes and experience frequent relocations. Chris emphasized the urgent need for additional classroom space for the TIES program and discussed the importance of determining whether the greater need is at the elementary or secondary level. She also stressed the need for a centralized location, as referrals come from across the county.

VII. *Students Served in County-Operated Programs

C. Borges

Chris shared the students served in county-operated programs as of April 3, 2025. This report shows the percentage each district makes up of the SELPA.

VIII. *Maintenance-of-Effort Update for 2024-25 SEMAI

E. Davidson

Eddie Davidson, Student Services Fiscal Director, provided an update on the Maintenance-of-Effort (MOE) status for the 2024–25 SEMAI. Based on current projections, all LEAs are expected to meet MOE requirements. Eddie reminded CBOs to remain mindful of their budgets, particularly as vacancies are filled and expenditures are fully realized.

X. *Private School Proportionate Share for 2024-25 Quarter 3

E. Davidson

Eddie presented the update on the Private School Proportionate Share for 2024–25 Quarter 3, accompanied by a handout. He explained that there have been significant changes from CDE regarding how the proportionate share must be calculated. Most member LEAs have only one or two students identified as parentally placed private school students with disabilities. Eddie clarified that these are limited, restricted funds to provide services for these private school students and that these funds cannot be given directly to private schools. He reviewed the updated calculation worksheet with the group. Additionally, he shared that, new this year, the same calculation process must now be completed for federal preschool dollars; however, the good news is that no parentally placed preschool students with disabilities have been identified, minimizing the impact.

XI. *Private School Proportionate Share Assurance for 2024-25

E. Davidson

Eddie presented the Private School Proportionate Share Assurance for 2024–25, accompanied by a handout. He explained that the assurance document has been sent to each member LEA for signature. Members are required to confirm that either they do not have any private schools within their district boundaries or that they have conducted Child Find activities and have not identified any parentally placed private school students with disabilities.

XII. Consolidated Federal IDEA Expenditure Report 2 for the 2024-25 Grant Award, Due 4/15/25

E. Davidson

Eddie presented the update on the Consolidated Federal IDEA Expenditure Report 2 for the 2024–25 Grant Award, which is due on April 15, 2025. He shared that the report has been sent out to all fiscal contacts and shared that a claim must be filed to receive the funds which are vetted through the SELPA. To simplify the process, Eddie provided a spreadsheet for members to complete and submit by the deadline.

XIII. Status of Local Plan; Annual Budget & Service Plans for 2025-26

E. Davidson

Eddie provided an update on the Status of the Local Plan, Annual Budget, and Service Plans for 2025—26. He shared that work is underway to prepare the plans, which are required to be submitted annually. The fiscal information for the plans has already been provided and approved and will be incorporated into the final documents. The first reading of the plans is scheduled for the Superintendents' Governance Council (SGC) meeting in April, with final approval anticipated at the SGC meeting in May.

XIV. Administrative Updates

T. Frazier

Trina Frazier, SELPA Administrator, shared that AB 560 (Addis), originally a spot bill, has been gutted and amended and is now titled the Special Educator Support Act. The bill proposes four major changes: lowering caseloads for Resource Specialist Program (RSP) teachers to 20:1, with initial assessments included in the caseload count; lowering caseloads for speech and language pathologists to 45:1; establishing a Special Education Team (SET) that would meet monthly; and setting specific special day class ratios based on disability categories. Trina noted that the bill would create mandated costs for districts, as additional staff would need to be hired to meet the new requirements and emphasized its significant implications. She also provided an update on the transportation bid process, stating that the bid has been released, a bid conference is scheduled for June, and responses to prospective bidder questions have been submitted through addendums. Additionally, she noted that, through negotiations, First Student has agreed that drivers will retain "squatters' rights."
